Sino-Japanese Studies Group Meets. The Sino-Japanese Studies Group, the organization that sponsors publication of SJSN, met on Saturday, March 18, 1989, 8-10 p.m., in the Kalorama Room of the Washington Hilton and Towers Hotel, in conjunction with the annual meetings of the Association for Asian Studies. Among other things, we discussed our future plans as a group and the directions in which we would like to see SJSN headed. Josh Fogel reported on subscriptions, responses to the first issue of SJSN, and suggestions that have come by mail. Doug Reynolds reported on the international conference in Beijing in late October 1988 (see the article by Barbara Brooks in this issue of SJSN).

Sino-Japanese Conferences at International House, Tokyo. Kokubun Ryōsei 国分良成, the only three-year subscriber to SJSN and scholar of Chinese political science at Keiō University, has sent us the programs from two conferences held at International House in Tokyo. The first was entitled "China and Japan: The Modern Era, Contemporary Times, and a Perspective on the 21st Century" (held June 19-20, 1987) and featured roughly an equal number of speakers from China and Japan. The second, "Phases of Modernization in East Asia, from the 19th to the 20th Centuries," was held on December 4, 1988. We hope that Kokubun will, in a future issue of SJSN offer a more detailed look at what actually transpired at these two meetings.
