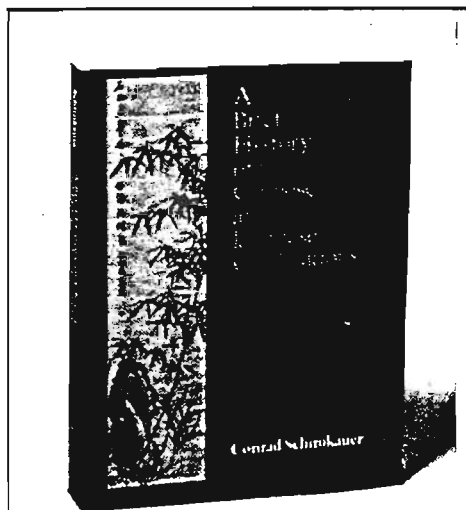

Each of the book's 25 chronologically organized chapters explores a major Chinese dynasty, Japanese shogunate, or other discrete period. Sections within some chapters have been subdivided in the *Second Edition* to be more easily absorbed by students and to allow for inclusion of the latest scholarship. This new edition gives precedence to the pinyin system for romanization of Chinese names, though the Wade-Giles equivalent is also provided.
